Poor Saint Patrick

Poor Saint Patrick! People have reduced memory down to green his beer. shamrocks, and leprechauns. Yet his life was an extraordinary example of a Christian hero. Patrick was actually British and as a teen was carried to Ireland as a slave. After a number of years there he escaped his captor and secretly sailed back home to Britain during which time he nearly starved to death. As a young man he felt the calling to ministry. Due to a lack of education he resisted the call. Over the course of several months he received a recurring dream in which he saw the plight of the people of Ireland and their need for Christ. There were months of agonizing and wrestling with the call until he finally accepted and set his mind to reach the people that had held him as a slave.

Upon arrival back in Ireland Patrick began to minister with confidence. He baptized many and even found local favor with political figures and dignitaries. Despite his loving and careful ministry he was always in danger and was imprisoned on a few occasions. His mission was specifically to the pagan people of the region. He taught them the gospel and how to leave behind their idols and to worship the Creator and not the creation. He would frequently use creation as an object lesson to teach people about their 2



loving Creator.

Patrick was known as honest, humble, and open. His writings are famously vulnerable and practical, surveying his own Christian walk. He had a habit of explaining deep theology with simple, everyday things. For example, Patrick is famous for using the clover as a symbol of the Trinity. There is also strong evidence that Patrick kept the seventhday Sabbath and taught his followers to do the same. To this day, Christians in Ireland can probably trace their family lineage back to Patrick's ministry. He was quite a man and an exceptional servant of Christ.


Upcoming Events

Service and giving back are part of their DNA. Huffs are missionaries at heart stepping up to do their part.


Huffs extend more than friendship. They sincerely hold up the hopes, dreams, and concerns of others in prayer extending compassionate caring and kindness.

Serving the community has always been a part of the Port Charlotte SDA Church. In the past, our most consistent outreach to our neighbors has taken place at the Community Service building. Recent events led to closing that ministry, and brought to light the fact that food and clothing needs are already well met by multiple churches and agencies in our area - some even right down the street.

The church staff recognized this may be the time to reassess the way we meet our community's needs. But what are the needs of the community? Church board chairperson, La Donna Blom-Antonio, did some research on this and found a study recently done by the Health Department of Charlotte County. Surprisingly, the biggest underserved population in our area is children.

These findings were discussed in the February 7 church business meeting. With our current community services closed, we have an opportunity to reassess the best way to



use that space to benefit children and families. While we continue to explore those possibilities, there are ways we can immediately partner with the health department to help intervene in the early childhood development of our neighbors.

For the month of March, we will be collecting new and "like new" books for babies through early elementary ages. Each Sabbath we will have a table in the foyer to collect the books you buy. Let's overwhelm the health department with a huge variety of beautiful books to make an impact in the lives of children around us.
